



Reduce Plastic Waste




-Every second **160,000** plastic bags are used around the world! -Less than **3%** are recycled worldwide. The other **97%** end up in our oceans or landfills, taking 500 years+ to break down SOLUTION:

-Every minute **1 million** plastic water bottles are bought in the world and sadly only **9%** are recycled -They take up to **700** years to biodegrade SOLUTION:

- Why not invest in a reusable water bottle?
- They are long lasting, come in a wide variety of colours and sizes. Some can even keep your cold drinks colder for longer and your hot drinks hot!



-It takes **400** years for plastic toothbrushes to decompose and if burnt they emit harmful chemicals SOLUTION:

- Bamboo toothbrushes are a brilliant alternative
- Bamboo is highly sustainable and is completely biodegradable & compostable
- If you use an electric toothbrush you might want to consider investing in recyclable toothbrush heads

Small changes like these can have massive benefits for the environment if we all work together to reduce our use of plastic & fight this plastic pandemic:)

Burglary Prevention During Winter

To ensure your home is not targeted this winter, here are some top community safety tips to follow as the dark and cold evenings approach:

- 1) **Lock your doors and windows** regardless of if you are in the property or not. The point of entry more than 75% of the time is through a door or window.
- 2) **Lock your UPVC doors with the key**. Flipping the handle is not enough to secure your door.
- 3) **Keep valuable items out of view.** Leaving valuables on view is an open invitation for a thief
- 4) Property mark your valuables with ultra-violet marking kits or Smartwater. When goods are marked it enables recovered property to be returned and improves the chance of conviction.
- 5) The security of the rear of the home is integral. Many burglaries are carried out via entry of a back door or window so make sure your back doors and windows are secure. If you have a side gate leading to your garden make sure it is locked.
- 6) Make sure your shed/garage is locked and secure. Don't give thieves the tools to enter your home.
- 7) **User timer switches.** In the winter months when it's dark and nobody is at home a timer switch can be set to activate a lamp on the landing or hallway giving the impression that someone is at home.

Cold Callers and Scammers – Be Aware!

Thames Valley Police are aware of the increased number of scammers and cold callers in the area. A cold caller is an unsolicited visit or telephone call made by someone trying to sell goods or services. Please be vigilant and below is an example of a sticker that are available for you to buy.

Flocks and Fields

Is sustainable, sustainable?

On a recent webinar with over 700 farmers, the argument was put forward that regenerative/sustainable farming is not in fact sustainable, as it could never feed the world. This got us thinking!

Modern agriculture has allowed exponential growth and crop harvest, it has also led to huge profits for chemical and petrochemical companies, producing ever more sprays and an estimated 186.67 million tonnes of fertiliser this year alone.

Let's address the issue that all farmers agree on that our job is to feed people. Can we feed the world with less intensive farming practices? Yes, we believe we can BUT we need everyones help. Currently we throw away 30-40% of food that we buy.

Secondly, 90% of the farms in the world are subsistence farms. A subsistence farmer, is one that only produces enough for their own use, without any surplus to trade. Yet they already produce around 80% of the world food. If the efficiency of these farms could be improved by even the smallest percentage, our world food production would increase dramatically.

Next, let's talk cost. Does regenerative farming make food unaffordable? The cost of food is complicated and down to more than just the price we pay in the supermarket.

Part of the problem is we have become used to cheap food. In 1970, around 25% of our income was spent on food, this has now reduced to less than 13%. However, other costs associated with food have sky rocketed. Tax payer money now has to be diverted to farmers to support farms that are selling food below the production cost. Health care costs have sky rocketed as lifestyle disease such as type 2 diabetes and obesity have become the norm. The cost to the planet has been possibly hit the hardest with global warming and extinction of species causing effects that will not only affect us but generations to come.

The choice is then yours, is it better to invest in your health and the health of the planet by buying from farmers and producers who farm in sustainable way, or accept the other costs associated with cheap food?

Colin Price
23rd January 1945 to
26th October 2020

Outside the History Club, Colin was a massively respected and liked member of our community, intrinsically embedded within the heart of much of what happened in North Marston. His knowledge and interest in history was an invaluable asset to us, and he wrote a number of the chapters in our village history book, The North Marston Story.

Colin has left the Club's Executive Committee with a legacy of memories, and at every decision to be taken in the future someone is bound to ask: "Well, what would Colin say?"

The Cutting Garden - December

There's not much to plant or sow in December but you can harvest lots of seasonal bounty for Christmas décor at home.

A few jobs for December

Prune climbing roses now removing diseased or damaged growth, tie in any new shoots. Prune older flowered side shoots back by two thirds of their length. If any of your rose bushes suffered from blackspot or rust this summer, remove any fallen leaves to reduce the chance of infection next year.

Winter prune wisteria, cut back summer shoots to 2-3 buds.

Leave the faded flower heads of hydrangeas until spring, they provide frost protection to the swelling buds further down the stems.

Clean out the greenhouse thoroughly. Wash the glass, the floor and the staging with horticultural disinfectant to kill any overwintering pests and diseases. Insulate outdoor taps or turn them off at the mains. Pack away hoses that are not required.

Feed the birds! Hang fat balls and keep bird feeders topped up to attract birds, which will in turn eat pests in your garden.

Wash and disinfect bird feeders, bird tables and bird baths

Wash down all of your garden tools and give them a wipe of linseed oil on the wood and metal to help prevent rusting.

Harvest seed heads, berries and hips: it's lovely to make a wreath using anything you can forage from the garden.

Christmas Past

The following are extracts from "The Northmarston Magazine" of 1875 and refer to the "Coal Fund" set up to collect money or goods in kind to assist the poorest residents of the village. The fund was overseen by the church.

"All persons in receipt of parish relief may have one hundredweight of coal at half price, before March 1, but if two or more persons with parish relief live in the same house they can only have one hundredweight between them, not one hundredweight each. Those who live below "The Bell" must have it of Carter and those who live above "The Bell" of Jerry Gregory."

"In future, the vicar will not persuade churchwardens to go round collecting for the coal fund...the Churchwardens find collecting from door to door irksome and trying...Mr Anstiss and Mr Lines, with one or two others, both object to giving coal away...and complain that poor people sat up very late last year burning away their coals! We believe poor people did actually sit up, some of them, till eight o'clock and even till nine! What are we coming to?"

The following is an extract from "The Schornian" magazine of January 1903 and refers to the "Clothing Club" which was managed by the vicar's daughter, Miss James.

"The Clothing Club money for this year, from our people's pennies, twopences, sixpences etc amounted to over £33 which has been duly distributed by Miss James, who has again commenced receiving contributions at 10.30 am on Mondays at Vine Cottage. The contributors find the accumulated subscriptions useful at Christmas time, almost like gifts in fact."

The committee would like to extend a sincere and heartfelt thanks to both Richard and Barry for their many years of service to the sports field and the community. We would also like to recognise Trevor Lane's commitment to the sports field as Chair for the last few years, ensuring that it has been run effectively and in the interests of the

village communities. We are also very pleased that he has decided to stay on the committee as the cricket club representative.

Despite the Covid crisis several key tasks have been completed during the year for which the committee are grateful to the volunteers concerned. These included:

- rolling the field as usual in March
- regular mowing and maintenance of the playing surfaces and trim trail
- repairing the entrance gate support post and pedestrian access
- resetting the dog poo bin which had become loose
- replacing the litter bin next to the pavilion with one with a lid to prevent birds pulling out the rubbish
- Erecting a new sign referring to the Sports Field Rules as well as further smaller signs around the fence line
- Ongoing maintenance and development of the nature trail, pond and surrounds to encourage as much wildlife as possible.

Like all sports clubs the football club has faced the same challenges as all grass roots sports but despite this the club has managed to keep going. We have 3 age groups currently playing in the Milton Keynes & District Development League – under 8's, under 9's and under 10's. Unfortunately, the under 18's team was a victim of the health crisis and had to fold without ending the 2019/20 season due to the March lockdown.

The teams are now "on pause" due to the current lockdown but hope to restart the season as soon as the restrictions end. Prior to the current lockdown we managed to run 4 taster sessions on Sunday mornings for our new under 7's team which will be entering the league in January 2021. It has been really encouraging to see the 14 new boys and girls interested in playing for the club so the taster sessions will continue again as soon as we are able to return.

Cricket Club

As with other sports and activities very little cricket was played by North Marston & Granborough cricket club during 2020. The Juniors had six sessions of indoor nets at The Thomas Freemantle School in February/March 2020 before we were stopped abruptly by the government Covid restrictions. Although we had a full league programme in place for all three Junior age teams, we were unable to go ahead with any of these as they were all due to be played in the midst of the first lockdown.

We did manage to practise in the outdoor nets for four sessions at the end of the summer which was great for the young players. It was clear that all those who turned up enjoyed these sessions and the club are hopeful that 2021 will enable us to resume our cricket activities once again.

The senior cricket squad managed to hold outdoor net sessions for several weeks but sadly with the restrictions in place, all bar one match was scuppered. This was played at home against the old enemy, Mursley. The result, shall we say, was immaterial.

Nature Trail

Most of the small trees planted into the hedge last winter have come through the winter and are growing well. The wild flowers sown along the fence borders grew well and will hopefully seed more for next Spring and Summer. Foxloves, Winter Aconite and Bluebells were planted in by the pond. Tawny Owls were heard calling in October, the time they select nesting sites. Trail Conditions prevented work parties clearing and maintaining and there will be much to do as soon as we can gather again.

England Rugby – Helena Rowland

News circulates quickly in the community but many of you may not be aware that we have a rising star in the world of women's rugby, and her family home is in North Marston. Regular visitors to the sports field in North Marston may well have seen a young lady training over the last few years encouraged by her mum, dad, or siblings, in all weathers.

Helena Rowland (21) was recently selected for the England squad and made her international debut on 1st November in the final match of the women's Six Nations Rugby, playing against Italy in Parma. Helena came onto the field in the second half of the match and quickly made an impression with England coming out 54:0 winners and so securing the Six Nations title and completing the Grand Slam.

Helena's second appearance came on 14th November, this time playing against France, in Grenoble, again on the winning side and with a thrilling run in the second half that set England on their way to victory. An audience of 800,000 watched the televised match.

Playing at fly-half, she played the whole match and had a stormer of a game as The Sunday Times endorsed the following morning with the sporting headline 'Rowland inspires Red Roses to victory' *A nice one for the wall of the sportsfield clubhouse.*

Helena appeared for her third cap, and her first Twickenham outing, on 21st November. This was the return match against France and was won by England with literally the last kick of the game.

Although Helena's ascendency to the rugby 15s squad has been quick, her rugby career, as you might expect, started from a very early age. She began at the age of 6 with mixed rugby in Aylesbury before going onto play at Bicester and Tring and then for Welwyn girls.

Her big break came when she moved to Saracens, where the women's team won the first Premier 15s championship. Helena was then selected to play for the England 7s and played afar a field as Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. She was in the 7s squad for the Olympics, which regrettably had to be postponed due to the Covid pandemic.

With the 7s squad disbanded earlier this year, Helena returned to play 15s at Loughborough and was then subsequently selected for the England 15s team. With the rugby world cup taking place in New Zealand in September/October 2021 and a re-scheduled Olympics in July/August 2021 we are looking forward to seeing much more of Helena next year, albeit through our TV and media channels

We wish Helena our very best wishes for the future and I am sure we will all join and offer congratulations on her superb achievements to date.



Playground Update

December 2020

Many people continue to enjoy the toddler area but unfortunately due to ongoing adverse weather conditions (persistent rain throughout October and November) we have been unable to complete the groundworks. With winter on us, we have had to take the decision to delay the seeding for the main grass area until the early spring. We are however hoping to lay the connecting path down to the junior area, once we have had a few consecutive days of dryness, so that the junior area can be accessed in the interim. The pagoda will also be erected over the winter which will provide a great sheltered spot.

Whilst we know this will disappoint many, please be assured that we are keeping a close eye on the weather so that we can make the most of both play areas, whilst we wait for the groundworks to be completed.

Public Rights of Way (PRoW): Footpaths and Bridleways: Responsibilities for Maintenance

The Parish Council is not responsible for maintaining footpaths, responsibilities are divided between landowners and Buckinghamshire Council (BC). This is a quick guide, detailed information is at https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/environment/public-rights-way/

Trees and hedges: it is the landowner's responsibility to maintain hedges and trees adjacent to PRoWs. BC has powers to require owners to remove overgrowth (Highway Act 1980 section 154). Undergrowth: BC are responsible for clearing any vegetation naturally growing on the surface of a path, and respond to requests for clearance as required.

There is nothing to prevent walkers from clearing PRoWs and Ramblers Association Path Clearing Groups do so in some areas. Leave the landowners vegetation: it is their property.

Autumn cultivation and PRoWs: Legally, a farmer may plough a PRoW only if it is not convenient to avoid disturbing the path, but must reinstate it within 14 days of first disturbance, and the path must be levelled and made visible, and within 24 hours of any subsequent disturbance. Reinstatement must be: at least 1 metre for a cross-field footpath, across the cultivation; 2 metres for a crossfield bridleway across the cultivations.

Report an issue on a public footpath, bridleway or byway online. https://prow.buckscc.gov.uk/standardmap.aspx

Eg: broken stiles; overgrown vegetation or fallen trees; damaged or dangerous path surfaces; damaged or dangerous bridges; damaged or missing signposts and waymarks.

Or, The Ramblers Association: Report path problems through Pathwatch and they will alert the local highway authority. https://www.ramblers.org.uk/advice/pathwatch-report-path-features-and-problems.aspx

The Ramblers have their Pathwatch App you can download and then report problems on your walk as you come across them.

We meet between 6 and 8 times a year and organise several social events during the year. We also support other village events such as the Charter Fayre.

Secretary's Report for Year 2019/2020

We currently have 11 Trustees but would still welcome more. During the last year we welcomed Emily D'Espaigne as a Trustee and Secretary. Emily is currently on Maternity leave and we congratulate James, Emily and Harrison on the safe arrival of Samuel.

Our responsibilities are to maintain the hall and grounds to an acceptable standard. The hall is used by many local organizations for meetings, regular clubs and special events. It is used by the Parish Council for their meetings, by the church in the absence of a church hall and as a polling station. It is also hired out to non-Residents.

During 2019 we continued with our fundraising events. These included a plant sale in May, taking part in the Charter fayre, the handicraft and produce Show in September, a coffee morning in October, a quiz night in November and a fish and chip supper in December. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic no fund raising events have been held during 2020.

The plans for the hall restoration were reviewed in early 2019 and the decision to phase and scale down the work using local trades people meant that the estimate of costs was significantly reduced from £238K to around £100K. We achieved our first significant grant from ACRE in mid 2020 and also derived money from Parish Council donations and AVDC micro grants. This boosted our money achieved from fund raising over the past few years and meant that we could begin some of the work.

Taking advantage of the hall being closed due to the current pandemic, internal improvements have almost been completed. These include insulation, redecoration, installation of oil fired central heating, replacement of damaged windows, reconfiguration of toilets to include disabled facilities, new doors and flooring.

We are highly likely to receive the balance of the funds required from WREN shortly and this will enable us to complete the external works by Spring 2021. Meanwhile the hall will remain closed until we can meet the COVID-19 control regulations.

We are grateful to Brian Sear who kept the hall clean and carried out minor repairs for many years. Unfortunately Brian has resigned so we will be seeking a replacement when the hall reopens. We also thank the Williams family who continue to mow the grass.

Our main aim for the future is to complete the restoration work and reopen the hall as soon as possible. Something we can all look forward to!

GRANBOROUGH VILLAGE HALL AGM 2020

A note from the Chairman - David Smedley

I think it goes without saying that the last year has been perhaps the most difficult the VH has faced in at least the last 75 years. Corona virus has impacted on every aspect of personal and community life. The VH has, since the early 1900 been at the centre of village life and activities but all this came to an end with the first national lockdown when we had to take the hall out of use and all regular, annual and one off events had to be cancelled.

It was just about 1 year ago that we were looking at the various quotations for the reduced restoration scheme and agreeing on what we would and would not do. We were also considering the impact on events for 2020 and when the hall would have to be closed. Perhaps the only positive thing that Covid has given us has been the opportunity to carry out the internal works to the hall whilst normal usage has been banned. For all those who have not yet been inside the hall it has undergone a major transformation with a combination of repairs, improvements and redecoration. Not least amongst these is the new colour scheme, central heating, refurbished entrance hall, new toilets and refitted kitchen. Additionally, there are a number of essential items which are not immediately visible, such as the considerable amount of thermal insulation work, renewed glazing and new electrics all of which will breathe new life into the old building for decades to come.

Unfortunately, it does not look so good externally, but this second phase should start in 2021 with new front timbers, roof repairs and redecoration.

Key to all the work, both completed and planned, has been securing grant aid to bolster our successful fund raising to a level where very extensive work has been possible. This has been key and so my sincere thanks to all involved in this behind the scenes work. To avoid the perils of omitting someone, as I was away for a good chunk of the year, my sincere thanks to all who have been involved be that a lot or a little in getting the project to this stage, and hope as many as possible will help in the next stages, which will include a good clear out and clean so that as soon as we are allowed the hall can return to use.

- a. Aquatic compost into the shallow areas where the current plants are so they can thrive. Aquatic compost because it-s purpose-made and low nutrient
- b. A barrier to hold the compost back from slipping to the depths, where it will sediment, and be lost from around the plants as above
- c. Surface covering plants
- d. The total cost £600 including VAT. Councillors agreed it is vital to maintain the pond and will review the document and feedback in the December meeting.

Website – Agreed the website needed modernising whilst making it accessible. Cllr Hogbin Mills to address this. The accessibility statement will be put on the website and the Clerk will allocate documents for councillors to review to make accessible through the guidelines.

Traffic Calming – Agreed Trevor Jenkins will present low cost solutions to the PC in the December/January meeting. There are 22 months of MVAS data plus the Truvelo equipment available now. Approved the quote of £185 + VAT for a new battery for the MVAS equipment from Swarco **Kerbing along Church Street** – The grant with match funding has been applied for on 26/10/2020

Magazine Update – The monthly magazine went online in November and has received very positive feedback that the whole of the 2 villages can see it online, it is climate and covid friendly.

One objective of the magazine is for all residents to be able to access it and it was agreed that for those NM residents that do not have internet access and used to subscribe can receive a printed copy upon request. An allocation of $\mathfrak{L}150$ will be reserved for this purpose.

North Marston Neighbourhood Plan Update

The disruption caused to the Neighbourhood Plan process by this year's severe limitations has inevitably resulted in a significant delay to the Steering Group's work, but we still intend to have a North Marston Neighbourhood Plan completed in time for consideration by residents in the early summer of next year. Current legislation stipulates that the earliest a final Plan can be presented for a Parish Referendum is 6 May 2021.

The Group expects to begin the initial drafting of the Plan in January, and we are currently assembling all the supporting factual evidence that will be needed to underpin the stated objectives in the Plan itself. These objectives are largely founded upon residents' responses to the 2018/19 Parish Questionnaire, and they form the basis of the general policies for the future which will be outlined in the final Plan.

To ensure as much parish participation as possible, we remain hopeful of being able to present the initial draft for comment and suggested amendment at an Open Exhibition sometime in the spring, before it is made available for general consultation. However, if that cannot happen then the draft will be placed on the village website for comment. We are very eager to give residents a chance to comment on and make their feelings about our initial findings known so that they can be considered before any final Plan is formally presented.

At the beginning of 2020 the Steering Group was looking forward to completing the North Marston Neighbourhood Plan before the end of the year and giving residents a clear and agreed pathway for the village's future in the face of all the proposed changes in the surrounding area. Circumstances have meant that this was not possible, but we remain committed to working hard to provide a Plan which, as far as we are able, ensures that in coming years North Marston remains the wonderful place to live in that it is today.
