Why is palm oil bad for the environment?

The rapid expansion of palm oil plantations has led to the destruction of huge areas of tropical rainforests- deforestation. This destroys the remaining habitats of already endangered species and releases a dangerous amount of CO2, which contributes towards global warming and climate change.

SOLUTIONS:) So, what can you do to help?!

- > Avoid products with palm oil in: Have a look at the ingredients list. Sometimes other names may be used to hide the use of palm oil, but the list of alternative names, including Palmitic Acid, can be found online
- >Bake, cook or make your own products
- >Choose products with sustainable palm oil eg: RSPO certified
- >Sign petitions and educate yourself and others about the problems of unsustainable palm oil

A walk from our lovely village of North Marston

chosen by Val Newby with a map by John Spargo Takes approximately one to one and a half hours.

Start at the village hall and then walk down Quainton Road for about ¼ mile until you see a Public Footpath sign on your right. (1)

Cross the field to the left until you see a stile and bridge (2) over the ditch

Walk diagonally across the next field to a gate (3) in the far hedge Bear right across this field to another gate in the hedge (4) and another wonky bridge

Bear left up the side of this hedge for about 100 yds. (5)
Now cross the field to another footbridge (6) (heading for the barn)
Cross another field to the barn (7) and cross another bridge (8)
leading to a large open field. Bear left following the way marker and go across this large field with sheep (dogs on leads) towards the pylon (9)


Go diagonally across the field to another stile (10) and the bridleway Turn left through a gate (11) into the field and then straight ahead with the wood (12) to your right.

Go through two more gates (13 & 14) making sure you shut them properly.

At a third gate (15) turn left along the grassy path by the hedge. The footpath turns right into a field (16) with a steepish walk up the hill back to the road. (17) Stay on the road until you get back to the Village Hall.

Thought for the month

Through Lent with the Psalms

This year our Lent Course of study is a weekly dive into the richness of the book of Psalms.

The psalms contain among them some of the best-known words of scripture:

When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is mankind that you are mindful of them, human beings that you care for them? (Psalm 8:3)

Taste and see that the LORD is good; blessed is the one who takes refuge in him. (Psalm 34:8)

Unless the LORD builds the house, the builders labour in vain. Unless the LORD watches over the city, the guards stand watch in vain. (Psalm 127:1)

The Psalms have been called the "Hymn Book" of the Temple in Jerusalem. As with our own hymn books we find many different types of song: Historical Psalms which tell a story, Liturgical Psalms which were used at moments in Temple services, Wisdom Psalms which reflect on how to live well, Praise Psalms which glorify God and, Lament Psalms – 40 of them – which reflect on life's difficult moments. All human life is here!

Whether or not you join in the course, I hope you have a blessed and fruitful Lent. If you aren't joining the course, you may nonetheless find blessing in spending a time each week reading a Psalm quietly to yourself. Whatever we are going through in life, be it joy or sorrow, triumph or regret, the Psalms offer us connection to the "still small voice of God" which is within us all.

The Cutting Garden in March

I think we are all more grateful than any year we have known to be welcoming spring into your lives and gardens this year!

A few jobs for March

Sow your hardy annual seeds under cover eg greenhouse, conservatory or windowsill. You can also sow perennials and some half hardy annuals but wait until later in the month when there are better light levels.

Pinch out tips of winter sown sweet peas to encourage side shoots. Make sure there are 4 to 8 inches high.

Feed trees, shrubs and hedges with a slow-release fertiliser eg comfrey pellets, chicken manure or fish, blood and bone.

Prune shrub roses to encourage strong new growth.

Order and plant bare root roses – much cheaper and often stronger growers than pot-grown plants.

Cut down old growth of perennials and grasses

Plant herbaceous <u>perennials</u> including those for picking, eg <u>delphiniums</u>. Take chrysanthemum cuttings

Plant dahlia tubers in pots or shallow trays if you have a lot, under cover so they can grow on happily until the frosts are finished. They'll start to sprout in a few weeks and you can then take cuttings.

Prepare areas in flowerbeds ready for direct sowing hardy annuals in later March through to April.

Check mowers are working, and service if necessary

Keep an eye out for signs of slugs and snails, especially around young vulnerable shoots.

Reactivate your compost heap – take advantage of any warmer, drier weather and turn the whole thing into a new bin and water on a compost activator, such as comfrey juice or seaweed.

Consider buying and hanging a bee nesting box.

The Bells of North Marston

At North Marston there were originally 5 Bells and a small Sanctus bell

the origin of the five being:

- 1 James Keene 1627 (Keene was based at Woodstock)
- 2 James Keene 1627 (Keene was based at Woodstock)
- 3 James Keene 1627 (Keene was based at Woodstock)
- 4 Richard Chandler 1699 (Chandler was based at Drayton Parslow)
- 5 Lester & Pack 1763 (Lester & Pack was based in London) Sanctus - Circa 17 century – Unknown founder

According to one of the church reports, in 1911, the Bell Ringers at North Marston were paid £1 0s 0d per year for their services and £-14s 6d were spent on the Church flag and bell ropes.

Between 1911 and 1924, the bells at North Marston had fallen into disrepair: 3 of the bells were cracked and all five of them were out of tune. (The bells are tuned to the key of F). Experts were called in and recommended that all five of the bells were recast and a new treble should be added to make a ring of six bells.


In 1924, the church launched the Bell repair fund, it's committee being: The Vicar, T.B. Biggs, H.W. Cheshire, A.E. Cheshire and F.M. Holden. They started with a sum amount of £180. By 1925, £450 had been raised for the bells, but the church still needed £150, the bells were taken away to the Whitechapel Bell Foundry in London, owned by Messrs. Mears & Stainbank where they were recast and the new treble was also cast. The lightest 4 of the old five bells had some extra weight added to them to put them in harmony with the tenor. After the bells had been rehung, Rev'd A. H. James said that the bells have beauty of "music and beauty of tone." A local newspaper said; "The village now boasts of a peal, second to none in beauty of tone and ease of

manipulation"

They were rehung in a Cast Iron frame with modern fittings and the Second bell is hung in the Second tier of the Bell Frame. The Sanctus bell is hung up high in the belfry on an old beam of the original Bell frame. The bells were not rung regularly for a number of years. most probably due to a lack in number of ringers. The bells were overhauled in 2010 by Whites of Appleton, Church Bell Hangers.

GVH Restoration Update

The internal refurbishment of the village hall has now been completed and it is looking good! The new central heating is up and running in time for this cold weather. All we need now are some chairs! The external work is now our priority and we plan to begin work in the Spring. The restoration includes structural repairs to the oak beams and doors at the front of the hall, re-rendering the walls and chimney where necessary, inspecting and replacing the guttering, roof tiles and painting. The good news is that we have received confirmation of a large grant from the FCC Communities Foundation that enables us to complete the external work and buy new chairs.

The plan is to hold a grand reopening of the village hall in early summer.



Love Your Countryside

North Marston and Granborough are wonderful rural farming village, thank you kindly for treating it all with compassion and care.

The Countryside Code:

- -Respect- Protect- Enjoy-
- -Keep dogs under control.
- -Leave gates as you find them.
- -Be considerate of the local community.
- -Leave no trace of your visit; dispose of rubbish responsibly

Enjoy Walking your dog:

- -Please consider your dog is an unfamilair animal to the livestock, please don't spook or stress any animals. Livestock worrying is a criminal offence.
- -If you ever feel threatened by cattle, <u>release your dog</u>. Do not protect it. You can then get to safety, and your dog can escape through small gaps.
- -Did you know dog poo can <u>spread disease to livestock</u>? This occurs when the livestock eat the grass grown through and around the dog poo. It is a common occurance and unfortunately results in death.
- -Bag It & Bin It. Any waste bin can be used for dog poo. Please do not leave it in a bag anywhere, as bagged poo has resulted in livestock and wildlife deaths in the area. North Marston has 8 red dog poo bins and 6 green general waste bins, dog poo can go in any of these.

On Farmland:

- -If ever you are attacked by a Bull or Cow, remove a piece of clothing and throw towards the animal as a distraction, to allow yourself to retreat to safety.
- -Please stick to the footpaths. Please do not wonder on private land. Please do not broaden paths Please do not destroy crop or wildlife by walking on them.

COUNCIL UPDATES

Public Rights of Way (PRoW): Footpaths and Bridleways: Responsibilities for Maintenance

The Parish Council is not responsible for maintaining footpaths, responsibilities are divided between landowners and Buckinghamshire Council (BC). This is a quick guide, detailed information is at https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/environment/public-rights-way/

Trees and hedges: it is the landowner's responsibility to maintain hedges and trees adjacent to PRoWs. BC has powers to require owners to remove overgrowth (Highway Act 1980 section 154). Undergrowth: BC are responsible for clearing any vegetation naturally growing on the surface of a path, and respond to requests for clearance as required.

There is nothing to prevent walkers from clearing PRoWs and Ramblers Association Path Clearing Groups do so in some areas. Leave the landowners vegetation: it is their property.

Autumn cultivation and PRoWs: Legally, a farmer may plough a PRoW only if it is not convenient to avoid disturbing the path, but must reinstate it within 14 days of first disturbance, and the path must be levelled and made visible, and within 24 hours of any subsequent disturbance. Reinstatement must be: at least 1 metre for a cross-field footpath, across the cultivation; 2 metres for a crossfield bridleway across the cultivations.

Report an issue on a public footpath, bridleway or byway online. https://prow.buckscc.gov.uk/standardmap.aspx

Eg: broken stiles; overgrown vegetation or fallen trees; damaged or dangerous path surfaces; damaged or dangerous bridges; damaged or missing signposts and waymarks.

Or, The Ramblers Association: Report path problems through Pathwatch and they will alert the local highway authority. https://www.ramblers.org.uk/advice/pathwatch-report-path-features-and-problems.aspx

The Ramblers have their Pathwatch App you can download and then report problems on your walk as you come across them.

Attendees: Cllr Mordue, Cllr Symonds, Cllr Du Plessis, Cllr Martin, Cllr Hogbin-Mills, Cllr Boyt, Clerk Rachel Callander & 5 members of the public **100 Club Draw**: February Draw: 1st prize 76 Pete Butler, 2nd prize 92 Kevin Ludlow, 3nd prize 93 Sarah Forsyth

- **1. Planning application: 21/00198/APP** agreed to ask for an extension of close date until 12th March
- 2. Buckinghamshire Council: Rapid COVID-19 testing is now available in Buckinghamshire for public-facing staff and volunteers. Buckinghamshire Council Growth & Recovery proposal to address post-covid economic recovery and growth across Buckinghamshire has been submitted. Buckinghamshire Council opposed the new Grendon Underwood prison. Elections will take place on the 6th May 2021. Restrictions Grant Funding open until 25th February. 2500 businesses have benefitted.
- 3. Neighbourhood Plan: The plan is on course with a draft expected end February to present to the PC prior to the PC April meeting. A detailed formal submission of aspirations from the Parish Council is required asap. Consultation period a database of all contacts connected to the village will be required.
- **4. Village Upkeep:** Village classification for the hedge cutting & mowing plan of 7 Parish hedges were identified that should not be cut between March September. One of these, the Village Hall hedge can be cut **IF** it becomes a safety issue for the users of the VH or from a road safety aspect. Finalise proposal with a map by end February to circulate to contractors. Agreed the Wildflower verge project will be extended to the 2 verges inside the NM gates from Oving direction as well as the verge opposite the Sportsfield. A timeline plan to be written and circulated. Agreed that the idea of a Parish Care Plan between the Parish Council and the village is a good idea. This includes items such as dog fouling/hedge cutting/potholes and grants for example. These will form part of the aspirations of the Neighbourhood Plan. The village will be asked

- what is important to them for example picking up litter/dog mess. Agreed a 'We are watching you' campaign for dog mess will be explored to encourage people to pick up after their dogs or be reported.
- 5. Parish Action Plan/Projects: Playground The project has been delayed due to the weather and Kompan are booked in for 1st March weather permitting. Cllr Du Plessis to follow up the grant claim with FCC. Agreed the CCTV will be installed by end February - Cllr Mordue. Traffic Calming - Agreed proposals from NMCSW for low costs speed solutions will be presented in the March meeting -NMCSW Team. Resolved – Identified companies speeding in the village will receive a letter. Updated the councillors with information from the Road & Transport Action Group meeting. TVP/Bucks Council will be asked why MVAS data is not taken into consideration with speeding problems. An application for another speeding device will be applied for from the Road and Transport Group this financial year. Land opposite 29 Quainton Road -Ownership of the land - The PC are waiting for Highways/AVDC to respond to an email sent 13th January and subsequent emails requesting help with the ownership of the land. PC boundary - The PC are waiting for clarification on the PC boundary between the PC Barn and the neighbouring land, based on advice from Bucks Council. Fence - Ian sent a letter to the ladies solicitor seeking to find a resolution to the fence. Todate there has been no correspondence from the ladies or the solicitor despite following up. Please note: The fence is not the responsibility of the PC and therefore the communication from lan is as a representative of a group of neighbours and not the PC. Notice Board (top of school hill). Agreed to ask PRA Randles to look at a solution for the notice board
- **6. Finance:** Agreed to transfer the EEC £300 request for 2020/21. Acknowledged the transfer of £150 for the history grant & the SF confirmation of grant spend will follow (2020/21 spend). Agreed the 100 club winners will be paid by cheque.
- 7. Next Parish Council meeting: March 9th 2021 Zoom
